The Larimer County Forestry Program functions to...

- Control hazardous vegetation on county properties and private lands that impact county right-of-ways
- Provide forestry and landscape information to county residents
- Provide insect and disease management for landscape plants and forests
- Conduct landscape field inspections for the Larimer County Planning Department
- Enforce state statutes concerning mountain pine beetle, Douglas fir beetle and Dutch elm disease
